John, Mildred Fox, Eilish Fanning and I also met with County Councillors from the Wicklow town area in the County Buildings.

Educate Together (including the CEO Emer Nowlan) have also been meeting with the Department of Education in recent weeks regarding our position. Thus, while we don't have definitive news to report, I am hopeful we will hear good news soon. This time last year 11 Educate Together 2nd Level schools did not have a site, now there is only Wicklow. So some progress is being made. In the meantime I would urge all parents/guardians in the school community to make as much noise as possible with their local councillors and TDs- in a democracy your vote matters to them!

We would especially like to thank John and Shauna for stepping up and shouldering a huge responsibility a year ago. All in the school should pat themselves on the back for the work done.

Astro-Pi Project

In October this year, 4 groups of 1st and 2nd years embarked on a coding challenge known as Astro Pi Mission Space Lab. This challenge offers teams of students the chance to have their experiments run on board the ISS. Phase 1 of this competition was for students to design and enter an experiment that focuses on either life on earth or life in space. Of the four groups we entered, two groups progressed to Phase 2. Each team that progresses to Phase 2 receives an Astro Pi kit (a small computer with a set of sensors). Students use these devices to code their experiment.

This was a long, difficult process and students spent many evenings creating, testing and editing their code with the help of teachers Ali and Patrick. Of the two teams that reached Phase 2, one of our teams' experiments received 'flight status' and their experiment will now be run on the ISS. The team was made up of 2nd years Rosie Anderson, Katelyn Byrne and Ioana Bosneaga. The next phase of this programme will begin early in the next school year when students will receive the results from their experiment and can analyse and write their final reports.

Educate Together Debating Final

ETSS Wicklow's late principal Colm had a wealth of experience from his work in education in Ireland and abroad, but he also had a great passion for debating which led to the creation of the first all-Ireland Educate Together debating competition. He really loved to inspire young people to take an interest in the world around them and fostered student voice that saw students grow in confidence because of their participation in the competition.

In his memory, ETSS Wicklow continued to grow and build this wonderful educational opportunity with the same kindness, generosity, passion and professionalism that he did. So, on Monday 24th of April all Educate Together students came together for the first in-person debating final at ETSS Wicklow, debating the interesting motion 'Cancel Culture is Beneficial for Society'. Congratulations to Galway ETSS who narrowly after some tough debates secured victory over Clogher Road.

STEAM Event

Ist year students exhibited their STE(A)M projects at the JCT pilot programme for STE(A)M in Tullamore. STEAM education is an ,interdisciplinary approach to learning that combines science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics.

Students designed hypothetical prototypes to address climate action in ETSSW. We are very proud of our 1st year students Marty, Vyga, Brigid, June and Odhrán who represented our school at the stand and addressed the conference with their views and ideas at the conference with Alicia, Amy and Amanda.

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Wicklow Library Visit

Wicklow library provided a warm welcome to our first-year students in a series of visits over the winter term. Librarian Loretta Rose and Archivist Gerlanda Maniglia brought the students on a tour of their fantastic local library highlighting its many facilities such as computer access, group study rooms and research facilities. Not to mention the extensive collection of fiction and nonfiction book suitable for their age.

A quick trip to the reading room, with beautiful views over Wicklow Bay, was followed by an examination of the replica of the Book of Kells and a visit to the gallery and exhibition space. Then it was down to the local studies hub where the students were given a tour of the local studies collection and were invited to return to carry out research for their history projects. All of the students were encouraged to join the library online which will give them access to the physical books in the library as well as eBooks and other resources online.

Model United Nations 2023 A Huge Success

After months of hard work and preparation, the day finally arrived for WICKMUN 2023 – in-person! ETSS Wicklow's late principal Colm Kehoe had great ambitions for the future of a youth MUN event in Wicklow. He had established 'WICKMUN' within months of opening a brand-new school and under his leadership WICKMUN 2020 not only survived the COVID pandemic but thrived in an online setting created by Colm (a first at the time!) so that students could still connect nationally despite the global pandemic.

MUN in a nutshell allows students from schools across Ireland to roleplay delegates from UN member states and simulate committees where current issues are debated. The benefit for students is clear, as it provides an opportunity to develop and use real world skills such as; research, drafting, critical thinking, teamwork, deliberation, negotiation, conflict resolution, leadership skills and make new connections.

WICKMUN took place from Friday 21st – Saturday 22nd April with 18 schools, 25 delegations, 16 chairs, 19 advisors and 156 delegates; it was a really huge conference. Of course, a big well done to the student team who led this conference brilliantly behind the scenes – Secretary General

Hannah O' Callaghan, Deputy Secretary General Lenna Smith, Bobby Connolly Head of Press, Admin and Media, Caleb Gunn our Head of Security and Eoin Edwards the Conference Manager. Simon Harris, the minister of Justice opened the event on Friday discussing Colm's great contributions and minister Jennifer Whitmore spoke about Gender equality on the 2nd day of the event. Every delegate deserves great praise for producing an opening speech, creating a resolution, developing a policy statement and researching issues on the agenda from the points of view of their countries so that they could properly represent them at the conference.

Colm's contribution to ETSS Wicklow and the Educate Together Ethos is immeasurable. He put his school on the map for many reasons. It is a real testament to Colm's passion for MUN and his commitment to studentcentred learning, to see his students continue his vision for 'WICKMUN' & the Educate Together Debating competition. As we finish another academic year we hope that students and staff of ETSS Wicklow have made Colm proud, as we know that hosting this conference and the continuance of his debating competition was a great dream of his which we hope will continue to inspire future generations.

Whole School Literacy & Numeracy Plan

We have some exciting and innovative literacy initiatives happening in the school this year including DEAR time, book club at lunch time, and book week to promote reading for pleasure amongst our student body. All teachers in the school are referring to Junior Cycle Action Verbs in their subjects to help students increase their vocabulary and experience greater success in exams. Students are also being encouraged to develop their editing skills for writing with the use of the 'Proof Reading Wheel' in their journals in classes throughout the day.

This term, our maths department launched an exciting 'Problem of the Week' initiative that is run through tutorial time to help students develop their problemsolving skills. We have also adopted a universal approach to teaching different concepts that appear in many subjects, for example, using SALT (Scale, Axis, Label, Title) for graphs and timelines. Teachers are highlighting numeracy moments in their subjects to help students develop their understanding of key numeracy vocabulary and experience greater success in this area.

Our afterschool 'Maths Support Centre' on Wednesdays has also been a great success and is very popular with students who want extra support in this area.

Advisory Board of Studies

The Advisory Board of Studies continues its work in maintaining high academic standards within the school through the promotion of innovative teaching and learning strategies. Over the last few years, the focus has been on literacy and numeracy. This focus can be seen in various initiatives in the school such as DEAR (Drop Everything and Read), the establishment of book clubs and library visits, book week and the school's active participation in national events, such Maths week.

Future initiatives will include the use of keyword notebooks to aid students in revision and reflecting on their own learning. Self correction wheel so students can check their own work before submitting it for assessment. More Peer Observation Weeks (POW) are scheduled for next year, where teachers take the opportunity to visit each other's classes and share insights on teaching methodologies.

2023-2024 looks to be yet another great year for teaching and learning at our school.

This committee is dedicated to making the school more environmentally friendly by doing things such as purchasing a compost bin and organising regular litter cleaning sessions. TY Mindfulness Workshop

It was with great pleasure that I recently found myself going back to school (after a 41-year gap!) when I joined my colleague Bronagh Hanna, to provide a workshop introducing "Koru Mindfulness and Stress Reduction Skills" to the two groups of TY students at ETSSW. Mindfulness is simply our innate ability to pay attention to our experience, as it happens, in the present moment and importantly, with an attitude of kindly curiosity. Koru Mindfulness which was originally developed at Duke University in the US provides an accessible and meaningful way to introduce college students to the many benefits of Mindfulness practice. The exercises support brain health in the same way that physical exercise supports the health of the body overall.

The Koru programme has been successfully adapted to meet the needs of senior students in High Schools in the US. Research shows that participating in Koru helps students feel less stressed, reduces self-criticism and improves both sleep and concentration.
